SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL LEARNING

EPISODES - Good Morning Daniel/Goodnight Daniel

FOCUS - Importance of routines

ACTIVITY: TRY THIS

Following a schedule each day makes children feel safer and happier, which often leads to better behavior and cooperation. When they know what to expect, and what's expected of them, kids feel more comfortable and confident about what lies ahead. Help your child make a picture chart of their morning and bedtime routines. Older children can dictate or write out phonetically captions for their chart. Having the pictures to refer to might make bedtime go a little bit easier once they understand that it will start all over again tomorrow!

SCIENCE THINKING

EPISODES - The Science of Staying Warm/The Seed of an Idea

FOCUS - Animals and their body coverings: fur, feathers and scales

PA STANDARD: 3.1.PK.A.5 – NAME THE BASIC PARTS OF LIVING THINGS

ACTIVITY: TRY THIS

Talk with your child about the different kinds of body coverings that animals have. Ask: What do cats and dogs have to cover their bodies? Birds? Lizards and snakes? Talk about fur, feathers and scales such as what they look like and what they feel like. Then play a guessing game to match an animal with the body covering. Name an animal and see if your child can guess what body covering that animal has. To extend this activity, your child can match animals with body coverings using pictures/drawings of animals and body coverings (fur, feathers, and scales).

EPISODES -The Pentagirls Problem/The Tree Problem of National Importance


FOCUS - Exploring height and length

PA STANDARD: 2.4.PK.A.1 - DESCRIBE AND COMPARE MEASURABLE ATTRIBUTES OF LENGTH AND WEIGHTS OF EVERYDAY OBJECTS

ACTIVITY: TRY THIS

Use yarn, ribbon, or string as a measuring tool for your child. Cut a few different lengths of the yarn and on a piece of paper draw bars or thick lines that match the lengths of yarn. Then, have your child match the yarn to its corresponding bar on the paper. Discuss which yarn pieces are longest, shortest and so on. Try measuring other items around the room with the yarn. You can point to toys, chairs, tables, etc. and prompt your child to measure it.

FOCUS - Literacy activity: making a birthday cake

ACTIVITY: TRY THIS

Gather some paper and crayons or markers for your child to create a paper birthday cake. Make a simple outline of a basic cake (square or round) and dictate instructions for your child to follow as they decorate and color the cake. It's ok if they scribble or color outside of the lines and be sure to prompt or give them clues to help them along. 1) Pick a flavor for your cake and color the side of the cake in a way that makes you think of that flavor; 2) Pick a frosting and color the top of the cake; 3) Draw and color candles on the top of the cake-- one for each year of your age; 4) Above the cake, write out "Happy Birthday".

SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL LEARNING

EPISODES - Daniel Learns About Lizards/Daniel Wonders About Trolley

FOCUS - Fostering curiosity and imagination

PA STANDARD: AL.1.PK.A - EXPLORE AND ASK QUESTIONS TO SEEK MEANINGFUL INFORMATION ABOUT A GROWING RANGE OF TOPICS, IDEAS, AND TASKS.

ACTIVITY: TRY THIS

Play a pretend trolley ride game! Let your child line up chairs in pairs or row. Friends and family members can pretend to buy "tickets" (imaginary tickets or homemade tickets) to get a ride. Fasten imaginary seat belts and go on an imaginary trip. Encourage your child's imagination by pretending to look out the window and talk about what you see along the way. Family members can take turns being the ticket taker, driver, and passenger.
