THE GREEN ECONOMY TASK FORCE

The Green Economy Task Force is a coalition of organizations, companies, government agencies, and citizens committed to the development of a Philadelphia economy that promotes economic growth, social responsibility, and environmental stewardship. Convened by the Sustainable Business Network of Greater Philadelphia in early 2008, the Task Force has engaged and collaborated with experts and elected officials from around the U.S. in its efforts to spur the creation of green-collar jobs for Philadelphians with barriers to employment. Composed of four committees focused on policy, funding, employer commitment, and job training, the Green Economy Task Force is currently designing a pilot program and curriculum for the Philadelphia Green Jobs Corps.

Policy

The Green Economy Policy Committee is committed to I researching and making recommendations as to how the City of Philadelphia may grow a green economy and create green-collar jobs through legislation, ordinances, and other policies. The Committee has reviewed successful policies in other cities, including green building ordinances, the creation of green zones, and energy policies. As a first step, the Committee has chosen to focus on a sustainable procurement policy that would help the City wield its purchasing power as an economic development tool by investing in local, environmentally sound companies and products. The Committee has produced a policy paper outlining recommendations and has shared it with members of City Council and the Procurement Department. The Policy Committee is also briefing Philadelphia's Director of Sustainability, Mayoral staff and others who will be crucial in moving policy forward.

Co-chairs



Christine Knapp joined PennFuture in 2005, with a background in grassroots organizing, issue campaigning and policy work. Her work at PennFuture is primarily focused on the Next Great City initiative.



Natalia Olson de Savyckyj, an Urban Planner at the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commsion, is a Mayoral appointee to both the Philadelphia City Planning Commission and the Philadelphia Zoning Code Commission.

Employer Commitment

The overall goal of the Green Economy Committee for Employer Commitment is to identify and engage leading and emerging companies in the Philadelphia region that are providing or creating job opportunities in green industry sectors. The short-term goal is to identify these companies. To this end, the committee has filtered the existing pool of Philadelphia-based businesses and has created an inventory of companies hiring within targeted sectors. The Committee has surveyed these companies to determine how many job opportunities each expects to create during the next year. The Committee's long term goal is to hold a series of leadership discussions with employers, workforce development organizations, and economic development agencies to identify barriers and solutions to successfully engage new hires in these green-collar jobs.

Karen Randal is the Manager of Commercial Development for the City of Philadelphia Department of Commerce. In this capacity, Karen is responsible for the attraction, retention and expansion of businesses for the City.

JOB TRAINING

In an effort to forge the connection between Philadelphians Lwith barriers to employment and environmentally and socially responsible businesses, the Green Economy Job Training Committee is working toward several goals. In the short term, the Committee is developing a selection process for admissions into green-collar job training programs and a list of desired competencies for job training program graduates. To complement these efforts, the Committee is also conducting research on workforce needs within green industry sectors. The Committee's work to date has been toward the initial longterm goal of providing job-readiness for 100 people. One work group within the Committee is finalizing selection criteria for green-collar trainees and the list of required competencies after training, while another is developing an Industry Cluster Survey, which will include a series of questions to be asked of selected trainers in green industry sectors.

John Elliott Churchville, Ph.D., J.D., is Director of the Community Leadership Training Institute of the American Cities Foundation, Chairman of the Board of Liberation Fellowship CDC, and Co-Chair of the Center for African American Research and Public Policy at Temple University.

Funding

Environmentally and socially responsible businesses need Philadelphia region. While some existing funding sources support these needs, none focus explicitly on green businesses. The Green Economy Funding Committee has identified as its short-term goal the identification of local, state and federal funding for the green-collar economy, and, as its long-term goal, the development of a capital fund for green business ventures in the Philadelphia region. The Funding Committee is currently engaged in monitoring the appropriation of \$22.5 million in federal funds for the Green Jobs Act of 2007; tracking approval of \$650 million in state funds for clean energy and energy efficiency in Pennsylvania; researching model green business capital funds established by other cities; and designing a data management tool for research on funding opportunities and providing access via a website.
